The Mexico City conference was CAMOC's second conference in Latin America following the ICOM 2013 General Conference in Rio de Janeiro. It aimed to promote debate and tackle issues like contested histories, post-colonial identities and re-interpretations of urban history, and the role of city museums as places of human respect and inclusion and of peaceful coexistence of all people – including the migrants who are present in every city population in the world.

More than 60 participants from 23 countries attended the CAMOC 2017 Annual Conference. Among them were a considerable number attending an ICOM meeting for the first time. This provided a great opportunity, both for CAMOC and for myself, to meet new ICOM members from different regions, inform non-ICOM members about the work carried out by ICOM, and attract new members. The location and simultaneous translation provided in English and Spanish also helped us to attract more Spanish-speaking colleagues from Spanish-speaking countries and regions.

The main theme of the conference connected directly to ICOM's 2017 International Museum Day theme, 'Museums and Contested Histories: Saying the Unspeakable in Museums'. CAMOC believes that, through paper presentations, workshops and roundtables, the conference offered an enriching perspective to ICOM's ongoing efforts to encourage museums to tackle contested histories and contemporary contested issues. The conference addressed various contested issues and stories from around the world, with a special focus on local and regional social issues pertinent to Mexico and Central and Latin America.

An online publication of the conference is under preparation and expected to be ready within the first half of 2018.

Organising CAMOC's 2017 annual conference in Mexico City was a big challenge, as the city had been shattered by a major earthquake just a few weeks prior to the conference. CAMOC decided to go ahead with its initial plans to organise the conference in Mexico City, although we were obliged to cancel two of the conference venues (ENCRyM and the Museo de la Ciudad de Mexico) during the planning phase. CAMOC is very pleased with the outcomes provided by this conference and with the opportunity that it presented for us to exchange views and experiences with colleagues from Mexico.

*Migration:Cities* / *(im)migration and arrival cities* is a special project funded by ICOM.

Project partners: CAMOC: International Committee for the Collections and Activities of Museums of Cities / CAM: Commonwealth Association of Museums / ICR: International Committee for Regional Museums

Given the relevance and scale of the current migrant crisis in Europe, and its impact in European cities, the *Migration:Cities* team agreed that it was important to hold its first project workshop on that continent. For the same reason, Athens was chosen as the initial host city.

*Migration:Cities* was initiated to explore the impact of the influx of migrants upon cities and the ways in which museums are collaborating with migrants to collect and present their stories. Nearly 60 participants from 16 countries participated in the workshop. Keynote speaker Dr. Petros Polychronis, Director of the Athenian Institute of Anthropos, provided a memorable metaphor in comparing this work to gardening, rather than building; his metaphor was referenced throughout the workshop. Local presenters spoke about the development of the Hope-School in the Skaramagkas Refugees Camp and other small-scale solutions in Athens, many of which are borderline-legal. Migrant and settlement organisations including Action Aid Hellas, Médecins Sans Frontières, and the Melissa Network of Migrant Women in Greece spoke about their programs; we also had the opportunity to visit the Melissa Network and to meet with some of the migrant women with whom they are working.

Museum professionals addressed the topic ‘City museums in the “post-migration” era,’ a term that refers to a unified society which tries to abolish the idea of citizens versus migrant populations. Papers addressed Germany’s history of responding to refugee and migration crises and the political reaction to the contemporary situation in Europe, specifically the impact on museum representations and activities; an historical perspective on emigration on Antwerp, Belgium’s Red Star Line, which transported nearly two million European emigrants to North America; and ways in which Museum Rotterdam has addressed this question, one of which is with the novel concept of ‘active collections’, including ‘artefacts’, such as the Mayor of Rotterdam, that are accessioned but do not physically become a part of the museum’s collections.

We watched a number of videos about related projects, held facilitated conversations in small groups, and visited local museums, including the National Museum of Contemporary Art, the Municipal Gallery of Athens, and Technopolis.

*Migration:Cities* Mexico City Workshop, National Museum of Cultures, October 28, 2017

*Migration:Cities* | (*im*)migration and arrival cities is a special project funded by ICOM.

The second *Migration:Cities* workshop was held in Mexico City on October 28; 52 delegates from 20 countries participated. The event, occurring so soon after the September earthquakes in Mexico City, came at a challenging time: 1800 monuments were damaged by the earthquakes and National Museum staff and colleagues are still busy determining the extent of the damage and the course for restoration.

The workshop began with a thought-provoking presentation, 'The Museum at the Centre of Arrival', by keynote speaker Doug Saunders, author of *Arrival City: How the Largest Migration in History is Reshaping our World*. Saunders provided an overview of migration, emigration and immigration patterns and explored the potential role of museums, libraries and cultural centres as institutions for inclusion. It is important, he explained, for host countries to understand the cultures of immigrants, and for immigrants to have the opportunity to share their culture with their children and with their new neighbours.

Most urban museums are concentrated in the historic district or downtown core. Saunders discussed the challenges created by the vacant spaces that typify immigrant residential districts – and the potential to create infill in the form of museums that will both make communities safer and provide an opportunity to create more social cohesion through cultural heritage initiatives. These museums may look different than traditional museums, reflecting the cultures of their respective neighbourhoods.

Our second keynote speaker, Mexican anthropologist Francisco Javier Guerrero, spoke about some of the challenges posed by in-country migration as well as immigration, and the need for greater empathy between peoples. In many ways we are all alike, he reminded the participants, but people migrate for different reasons, patterns change through time, and there remain cultural differences that we need to make an effort to understand. He emphasised the importance of intangible, as well as tangible heritage.

CAMOC's Marlen Mouliou introduced the *Migration:Cities* project and encouraged workshop participants to contribute to the website that is currently under construction. She noted that a toolkit, with information about how to contribute, would soon be available on the CAMOC website at <http://network.icom.museum/camoc/projectsworkshops/workshops/L/8/> and she suggested that participants consider: How is migration impacting their cities? How are museums engaging with migrants and migration support agencies to develop exhibitions and programmes?

Several presentations involved museum workers in different parts of the world discussing migration-related initiatives in their own museums – whether related to current or past migrations – including a presentation by CAM board member Rachel Erickson about the development of a new exhibition about immigrants in the City of Winnipeg, Canada, that will be mounted at the Manitoba Museum, as well as presentations by Annemarie de Wildt about an exhibition under development called *Representing Amsterdam – Music and Migration*; a presentation by Jenny (Chunni) Chiu, Hiromi Takeo, and Kaori Akazawa titled

‘(Im)migration and Museum Trends in Japan’; a presentation by Andrea Delaplace about immigration heritage in São Paulo; and a video contribution Sara Kariman called ‘The Functionality and Necessity of a Museum’s Attention to Immigration with a Case Study of Afghan Refugees in Iran’.

We then featured a panel of papers from NGO representatives who focus on migration in Mexico City, including Irazú Gómez Vargas on ‘Hospitality Response to Migration in Mexico’ and Fabienna Venet Rebiffe and Inés Giménez Delgado on ‘Open Museums: Spaces of Social Participation for Inclusion from Diversity’. Together, they provided a good overview of migration issues in Mexico and engagement with museums. The speakers pointed out some of the difficulties in working with migrants – that they are trapped in a position that makes it difficult for them to think about museum collaborations, that the transient nature of their lives makes any sort of commitment a challenge, that they feel stigmatised by their situation, that they often fear potential repercussions from speaking publicly.

We showed a number of videos that have been created for inclusion on the *Migration:Cities* website – and are already available on the CAMOC YouTube channel. The day concluded with a workshop led by Linda Norris, of the International Coalition for Sites of Conscience, who led participants through a series of exercises designed to increase self-awareness and empathy for migrants. At the end of the day Norris asked everyone to record on post-it notes what we would do differently in the future as a result of the day’s discussions.

Following an incredible stop at the Day of the Dead parade, we held a reception that night at the Museum of Popular Art, which was notable for the fantastic creatures that appeared throughout the evening.

Preparations of Mexico City Proceedings:

Work on the preparation of our Mexico City conference proceedings is underway and we anticipate completion in March 2018. The proceedings will be published as an e-book and made available via the CAMOC website.

The main publication language is English. A part of the texts will also be available in Spanish (c. 25% of all contributions), while abstracts in Spanish will be included for other texts. Regarding the book's scope, at least a 100,000-word publication is expected.

The CAMOC team has been working on the proceedings with the help of an external English proofreader, a Spanish translator, and a designer.

**Result(s):** More than 20 partnerships and collaborations were established throughout the year, including those initiated for future planning. CAMOC was represented in several ICOM and non-ICOM meetings to strengthen collaborations with international networks, including ICOM Pakistan, Pakistan Museum Association, UNESCO, OECD, European Network of City History Museums, and Korean Museum Associations. CAMOC also developed collaborations and partnerships with bodies such as ICOM Mexico, ICOM DRMC, ICOM MDPP, International Coalition of Sites of Conscience, and various museums and NGOs. The results were achieved in various formats, from publications to the content of web platforms, from jointly sponsored panels to workshops, and from video recordings to social media contents.

### **Networking - CAMOC Mexico City 2017 Annual Conference**

**MDPP: Museum Definition, Prospects and Potentials Standing Committee:** As a partnership with ICOM MDPP (Museum Definition, Prospects and Potentials Standing Committee), CAMOC and MDPP organised a roundtable on 30 October 2017, during the Mexico City Annual Conference. On behalf of ICOM MDPP, Afşin Altaylı – a member of ICOM/MDPP and Secretary of CAMOC - made an introductory speech to communicate the mandate, vision, objectives, and working methodology of MDPP.

The MDPP roundtable organised in Mexico City was a part of the roundtables series conducted by MDPP in various international meetings throughout the year, following previous ones held at the Paris ICOM Annual Meetings in June 2017, ICR's Helsinki Annual Conference in August 2017, and Yeongwol International Museum Forum in September 2017.

Thirty-two participants in total (22 in English-speaking and 10 in Spanish-speaking groups) attended this session. Their answers to the MDPP questions were recorded and collected to help ICOM to collect as many views as possible to support ICOM's ongoing debates for a new museum definition.

**DRMC: ICOM Disaster Risk Management Committee:** France Desmarais, Director of Programmes and Partnerships, International Council of Museums (ICOM) attended the CAMOC Mexico City Annual Conference to represent ICOM DRMC; she also gave a presentation titled 'Museums on the Edge: Culture Caught in the Crossfire'.

**ICOM Mexico:** ICOM Mexico was one of the main partners of the CAMOC 2017 Annual Conference and helped CAMOC to organise the conference in Mexico City. ICOM Mexico was represented at the meeting by Maya Dávalos Murillo, ICOM Mexico Chair; Maria Inés Madinaveitia Ramírez, ICOM Mexico Coordinator; and Pedro Hernandez.

**National Museum of Cultures:** The National Museum of Cultures (Museo Nacional de las Culturas del Mundo) was one of the three main conference partners and the host institution (venue) of the CAMOC Mexico City Annual Conference.

**ENCRyM:** National School of Conservation, Restoration and Museography, National Institute of Anthropology and History (Escuela Nacional de Conservación, Restauración y Museografía, Instituto Nacional de Antropología e Historia) was one of the three main conference partners of CAMOC Mexico City Annual Conference.

**International Coalition of Sites of Conscience:** Panel – 'Turning Memory into Action: The International Coalition of Sites of Conscience' Moderator: Linda Norris, Global Networks Program Director, International Coalition of Sites of Conscience

The 2<sup>nd</sup> day of the CAMOC Mexico City Annual Conference featured a panel organised as a collaboration with the International Coalition of Sites of Conscience. The panel was led by Linda Norris of the International Coalition for Sites of Conscience together with two more delegates of the conference and members of the Coalition: Nayat Karakose, Hrant Dink Foundation (Turkey) and Beatriz Aguila Mussa, Museum of Museo de la Memoria y los Derechos Humanos (Chile).

### **ICOM DEMHIST and ICOM ASPAC:**

The kick-off meetings of these partnerships were held during ICOM's Annual Meetings in June 2017.

ICOM DEMHIST: A joint session with ICOM-DEMIST including keynotes and parallel sessions and a potential off-site meeting is being planned for the Kyoto gathering. The plans will be detailed mainly with the help of DEMHIST board member and Nijo Castle Curator Yasuhiro NAKATANI.

ICOM ASPAC: A joint session with ICOM-ASPAC, including keynotes and parallel sessions, is being planned for the Kyoto gathering. The detailed plan is being developed by CAMOC Chair, Secretariat, board members, ASPAC chair-Kingdo BAE and vice chair-Yuji KURIHARA.

We are seeking support from The Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA) and International Research Centre for Intangible Cultural Heritage in the Asia-Pacific Region etc. for this joint session.

### **Networking - Migration:Cities Project**

**ICR: International Committee for Regional Museums:** ICR is one of the 3 main partners of the ICOM Special Project *Migration:Cities | (im)migration and arrival cities*. In 2017, a series of online meetings and exchanges took place between project members (CAMOC/CAM/ICR) in order to plan the work of the forthcoming year. ICR Chair Irena Zmuc represented ICR in Athens Workshop, which was held on February 2017. Inspired by *Migration:Cities*, ICR launched a sub-project with ICOM SEE: *Regional Museums on the Balkan Route of Migrations*.



**CAM: Commonwealth Associations of Museums:** CAM is one of the 3 main partners of the ICOM Special Project: *Migration:Cities | (im)migration and arrival cities*. In 2017, a series of online meetings and exchanges took place between project members (CAMOC/CAM/ICR) in order to plan the work of the forthcoming year. The team met face-to-face during the project's first (Athens, February 2017) and second workshop (Mexico City, October 2017). Catherine C. Cole (both Vice Chair of CAMOC and General Secretary of CAM) represented CAM in this project.

CAM included a panel related to the *Migration:Cities* project in the program for the Heritage and Nation Building Symposium, part of CAM's Triennial General Assembly in Calgary, Alberta, Canada. The panel was moderated by Carrie Lunde of ICR and Catherine C. Cole of CAM/CAMOC. Talks included:

- 'Lessons from a Migration Museum Microcosm: A Case Study from Aotearoa New Zealand', by Dr. Jane Legget
- 'Migration + Memory = Museums', by Alissandra Cummins
- 'The Heritage of Transatlantic Encounters: Connecting Three Worlds through Shared Roots and Union', by Louisa Nnenna Onuoha (Onuoha was unable to attend, due to her inability to obtain a visa prior to the event)

**ICOM Mexico:** ICOM Mexico was one of the main partners of the *Migration:Cities* Workshop and helped CAMOC to organise the workshop in Mexico City. ICOM Mexico was represented at the workshop by Maya Dávalos Murillo, ICOM Mexico Chair; Maria Inés Madinaveitia Ramírez, ICOM Mexico Coordinator; and Pedro Hernandez.

**UNESCO:** UNESCO officials met to discuss potential cooperation between UNESCO and CAMOC in May/June 2017 and clarified the following points:

- Before 2011, there was a unit within UNESCO dedicated to collaboration with museums. It was abolished due to financial restraints and responsibilities divided among several sections. The last collaborative effort dates from 2006, when ICOM and UNESCO jointly convened an international meeting of experts on migration museums in Rome to exchange ideas on the role of museums in promoting cultural diversity and integration policies.
- UNESCO showed a keen interest in CAMOC's project and the Athens workshop report was shared with those concerned.
- UNESCO recommended discussing a closer collaboration with museums and CAMOC in particular at the next meeting of ECCAR (The European Coalition of Cities against Racism).

- Next steps: it was agreed that, following the exchange of reports, an initial meeting between UNESCO and the CAMOC executive committee could be organized in the fall to develop possible courses of action, leading to improved coordination and collaboration.
- UNESCO is represented by Smaro Skoulikidis, who is willing to be involved in preparing the Frankfurt Workshop 2018.

**Non-ICOM Partners of the Athens Workshop:** The Municipal Gallery of Athens and Athens Municipality served as a partner and host. Melissa Network of Migrant Women served as a contributor and partner for the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of the workshop. Action Aid Hellas, Médecins Sans Frontières served as contributors to the workshop.

**Non-ICOM Partners of the Mexico City Workshop:** National Museum of Cultures (Museo Nacional de las Culturas del Mundo) and ENCRyM - National School of Conservation, Restoration and Museography, National Institute of Anthropology and History (Escuela Nacional de Conservación, Restauración y Museografía, Instituto Nacional de Antropología e Historia) were the main partners of the workshop. The Museum of Popular Art hosted the workshop reception. Sin Fronteras and the Institute of Studies and INEDIM (Dissemination on Migration A.C.) served as workshop contributors.

**International Coalition of Sites of Conscience :** Workshop: ‘Getting Uncomfortable: Working Outside your Comfort Zone’. Facilitator: Linda Norris, Global Networks Program Director, International Coalition of Sites of Conscience. The *Migration:Cities* Workshop held in Mexico City concluded with a workshop in which Linda Norris of the International Coalition for Sites of Conscience led participants through a series of exercises designed to increase self-awareness and empathy for migrants. At the end of the day she asked everyone to record on post-it notes what we would do differently in future as a result of the day’s discussions.

### Others

**ICOM PAKISTAN:** The ICOM National Committee of Pakistan and the Museums Association of Pakistan organized a seminar on ‘Building City Museums’ with the collaboration of COMSATS University, the Punjab Council of Arts, and the Ministry of Culture of Punjab. The Seminar was held on the 25th of May 2017 in the historical city of Lahore, the capital of Punjab province in Pakistan. The seminar intended to foster knowledge about city museums among museum professionals, local politicians, and academics. CAMOC was kindly invited to offer an international panorama of city museums in our time, including some examples of

recently created or remodelled ones. Another lecture was presented on the 26th of May, at the University of Art and Culture at Thap Forum Lahore, to a class of very interesting and up-to-date students of architecture and design.

**OECD:** CAMOC Chair Joana Sousa Monteiro represented ICOM and CAMOC at two OECD meetings in 2017.

OECD Meeting - 22 September 2017, Paris: ‘Culture and Local Development: Maximising the Impact - Towards an OECD Guide for Local Governments, Communities and Museum’s.

The OECD Guide for local authorities and museums will inform and support policy makers and the museum community in designing successful local cultural development strategies by:

- Identifying principles and measurement indicators to help local governments and museums to increase the development impact of cultural heritage;
- Building a repository of good practices;
- Distilling lessons for policies in the area of culture and tourism, employment and skills, health, business development, innovation and spatial planning;
- Facilitating exchanges and networking.

The guide will include a self-assessment component intended as a learning tool, as opposed to a benchmarking, ranking, or performance assessment tool. Local authorities or museums can select all or a limited number of themes; propose new themes and indicators; and/or simply contribute to the repository of good practices.

CAMOC’s Chair was invited to participate, as the issue of museums in urban contexts, and of city museums in particular, is particularly relevant to the discussion.

The project is due to continue in 2018.

OECD/LEED Governing Board Meeting – 24 November 2017, Paris: At the November 2017 meeting of the OECD/LEED Governing Board, which , comprised representatives of the ministries of regional development, employment, and economy of OECD member states, CAMOC’s Chair delivered a talk entitled ‘City Museums and Local Development – Growing Together, Valuing Each Other’, about the economic and social value of city museums to modern societies. The talk preceded a presentation of the project ‘Culture and Local Development: Maximising the Impact - Towards an OECD Guide for Local Governments, Communities and Museums’, made by Ekaterina Travkina, OECD staff..

**European Network of City History Museums:** The MUHBA – Museum of the History of Barcelona -- is the coordinator of the informal European Network of City History Museums. The network members meet in Barcelona every one or two years. The Museum of Lisbon is one of the members, and as CAMOC's present Chair is the director of that Museum, CAMOC has been discussed in the two last meetings, in 2015 and 2016.

On the 25th of April of 2017, the Museum of Barcelona promoted the first seminar of the series named 'Reinventar el museu de la ciutat' (Reinvent the city museum), regarding its own remodelling project. The Chair of CAMOC was invited to present the lecture 'City Museums: new strategies as spaces of citizenship', which considered definitions of city museums, renovation strategies, and main international trends.
