- -Focus on the recent paradigm shift in 2007/2008 from the Vancouver Museum to the Museum of Vancouver (A deeper historical context is also considered)

Research Contributions

- -My research lies both in behind the scenes of the transition itself and how this transformation manifested itself (i.e. case studies)
- -How this contributes to a new paradigm manifesting in urban museums by thinking about the benefits, challenges, pitfalls and lessons learned for museums going through similar transitions






Museum Ethnographic Findings at the Museum of Vancouver (MOV)

MOV Paradigm Shift from 2008 onwards

- -Examined the institutional work behind the Reenvisioning and Rebranding of MOV:
- 1) Organizational Restructuring of Staff
- 2) Staff challenges, successes, tensions in this restructuring including its effects on collections

From a Collections-based Model to an Engagement-based Model

Nancy Noble, CEO (2005-2016) states:

"Some people may argue that the collections had been neglected but in fact when I got here there was almost nobody looking after the collections...this is a resource we need to use *to engage* the community...this is how we are going to tell the stories...so we actually have put more resources into the collections then before I got here...individual curators did that [before]but off the sides of their desks" (Roy, 2015: Interview Data)

Repatriation (Engagement on their terms)



In late 2013, MOV received a request from the Sts'ailes First Nation for the repatriation of the Sasq'ets [Sasquatch] mask and "was pleased and honoured to be able to follow through with the repatriation in 2014" (MOV, 2014: 28)


