Visit Ellis Island and the Statue of Liberty Battery Park, 10:00 AM

Hop on board the ferry to two of New York's most celebrated sites, which celebrate our city's role as a beacon and a gateway for immigrants. Visitors will receive an overview of the two islands; Liberty Island includes a museum, and the group will have the option to go to the top of the Statue's Pedestal. Ellis Island includes the National Museum of Immigration, with exhibits on the three eras of US immigration: *Peopling of America*, *Ellis Island*, and *New Eras of Immigration* (contemporary). Free audio tours in 12 languages are available on both islands.

The Tenement Museum 103 Orchard Street (corner of Delancey and Orchard) at our Museum Shop & Visitor Center, 10 AM

The Tenement Museum tells the stories of working-class tenement residents who moved to New York City from other countries and other parts of the country. Their work helped build the city and nation, and their stories help us understand our history. While textbooks often overlook the stories of ordinary people, our tours immerse visitors in the tenement hallways, kitchens, and parlors where families carved out new lives. We share primary sources and research that help us explore the stories of tenement families. By sharing these stories, we aim to build an inclusive and expansive American identity and believe that the exploration of our complex history—one with moments of both inclusion and exclusion—helps prepare us to recognize and discuss today's complex issues with empathy and nuance. Visitors will be invited to attend a building tour and a walking tour of the historic Lower East Side neighborhood and will receive a 15% discount for the Tenement Museum bookshop.

Please note: Backpacks and larger bags are not permitted on tours inside the Tenement Museum since the spaces are small.

Walking Tour of Central Park Museum of the City of New York, 1220 Fifth Avenue, 10 AM

Join Gabe S. Tennen, MCNY researcher and tour guide and Ph.D. Candidate in History at Stony Brook University, for a walking tour of Central Park. Constructed between 1857 and 1876, Central Park represented a new push by municipal leaders for public green space in an increasingly crowded and diverse city. Over the next century and a half, the Park reflected New York's highest highs and lowest lows, often serving as a backdrop for cultural change and social conflict. Join Gabe for a ninety-minute excursion that will explore the Park's past, present, and future.

Walking Tour of East Harlem with Artist Manny Vega Museum of the City of New York, 1220 Fifth Avenue, 10 AM

Let's take a cultural stroll around East Harlem (aka El Barrio, Spanish translation for "the hood"), MCNY's own neighborhood and a center of Puerto Rican culture and history in New York. Join MCNY Curator of Community Histories, Monxo López, and mosaic artist and muralist Manny Vega, whose art works adorn more than a few of El Barrios' public spaces, including a subway station, and who will be the subject of an MCNY exhibition in late 2023.

We will stop at a few cultural spaces and delve into some of Manny Vega's beautiful mosaics in the neighborhood. Time permitting, we will also visit a local community garden.

Participants will actively explore ways to work collaboratively with local communities to identify sites of conscience—places that can tell stories of the past, present, and future of human rights. From climate change to religious persecution, from food deserts to Black Lives Matter protests, these spaces are abundant in anywhere we live. We'll dive into ideas such as

- What skills are needed to engage in inclusive and equitable justice-building with community members to identify places and encourage the building of more just, inclusive futures?
- How do we do this work outside of our museum walls?
- How do we represent abstract ideas just as absence and hope?

Collecting the city through co-creation Classroom C

Gonca Yalciner, Amsterdam Museum, Netherlands

Projects based on equality, in which ownership is shared; that is the core of co-creation. This method is frequently employed by the Amsterdam Museum, but in essence is only possible with the many partners and co-owners of the projects. During the workshop I will be sharing our toolkit in an interactive way.

Our toolkit is based on various projects from our Collecting the City programming, which the Amsterdam Museum has realized in recent years through co-creation with different collaborative partners. We compiled this tool kit based on findings from these collaborations. The tool kit describes one of the possible ways co-creation can be utilized. It is not the only way; around the world, co-creation is employed in many other different and successful ways as well. Co-creation is a method that the Amsterdam Museum enjoys employing in various projects, so the aim of this workshop is to share the knowledge we have gained with the participants.

In search of collective memory: The New York Satellite of the Collective Museum Quinson Room

You will participate in the first steps of the New York Satellite of the Collective Museum. Embark on the journey with us to discover our practice and how we transform the absence of museums in Casablanca into an artistic gesture to create a museum out of the wall and to activate political negotiation.
